Writing good paragraphs

- Each body paragraph should be based on one main point which supports your opinion and should consist of as many supporting sentences as possible, which prove your point.
- 2) One of the major difficulties students have is developing their points of discussion in detail. Often their supporting sentences express ideas in a general or vague way. In each paragraph you should focus on one point of discussion and develop it in clear, specific detail. The easiest way to add detail to paragraphs is to describe a specific example you know well, which could be based on a personal experience or a news event.
- 3) One of the reasons why students write too generally is because they try to deal with too many major points. If you are only allowed to write 200 words you can't deal with all aspects of a subject, so don't try to. Simply choose two (or three) idea(s) you are knowledgeable about and focus on developing them.
- 4) The second reason why students often express themselves vaguely is because they overuse vocabulary which has a general meaning, for example good, bad, large, interesting, friendly, without explaining how or why what they are describing or expressing an opinion on is good, bad, large, interesting etc.

Look at the following letter for an example of a piece of writing which is both vaguely expressed and lacks detailed content.
